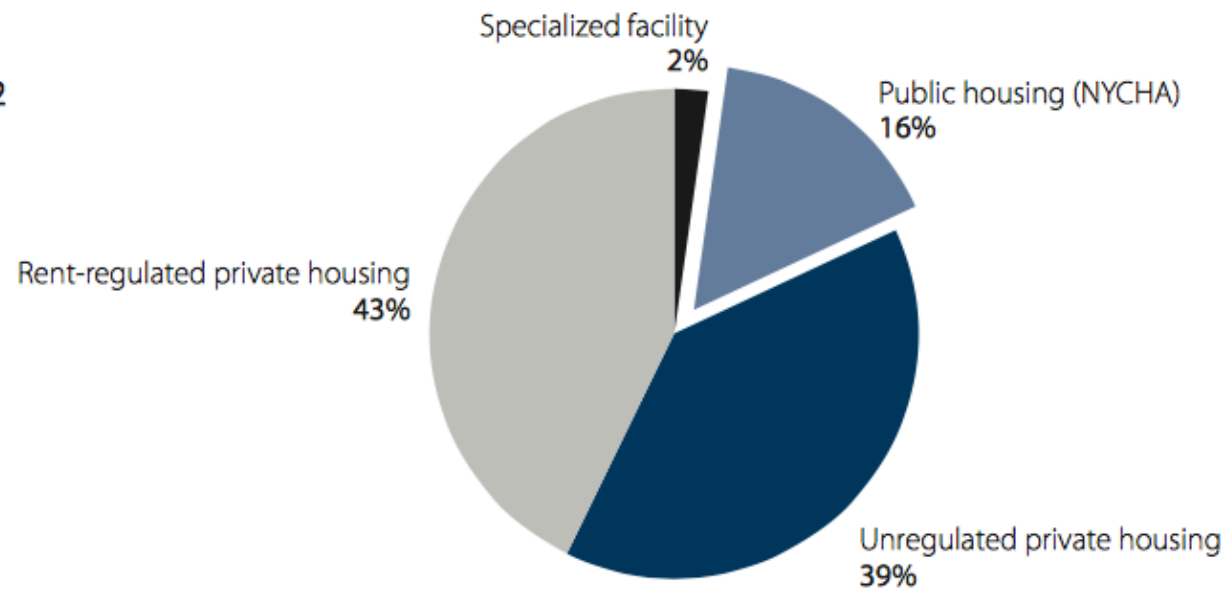
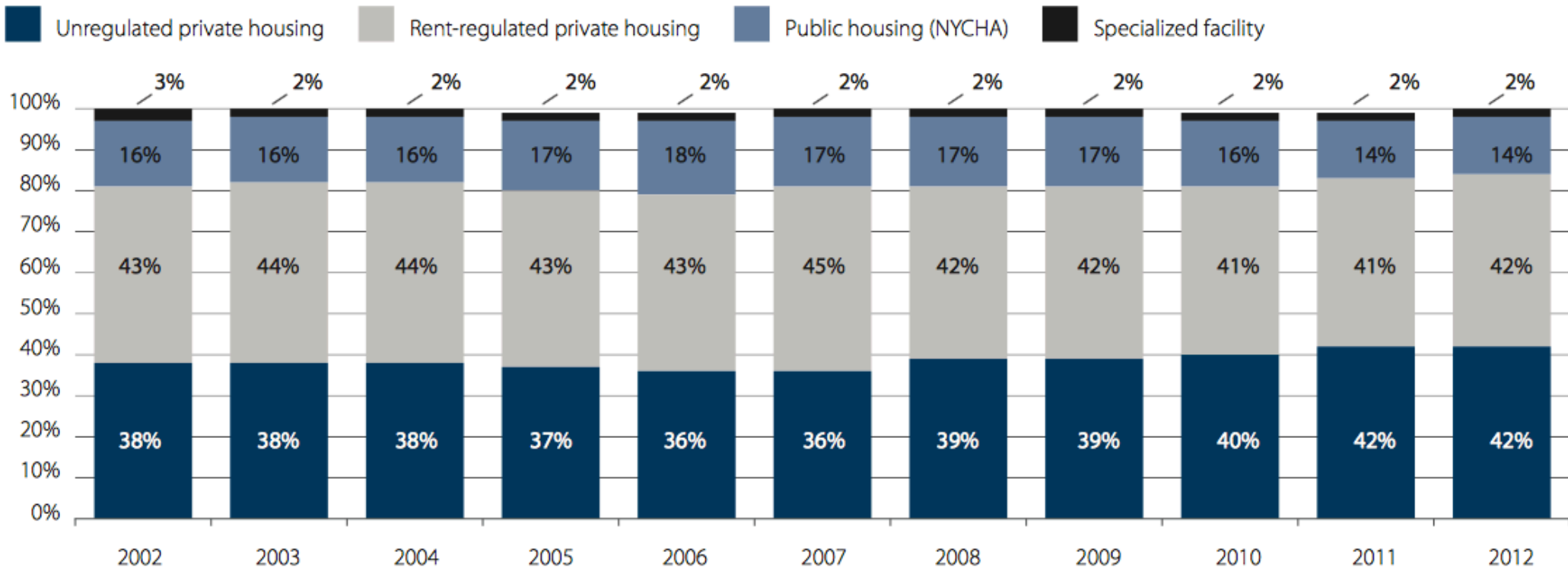

(by address of last housing type)



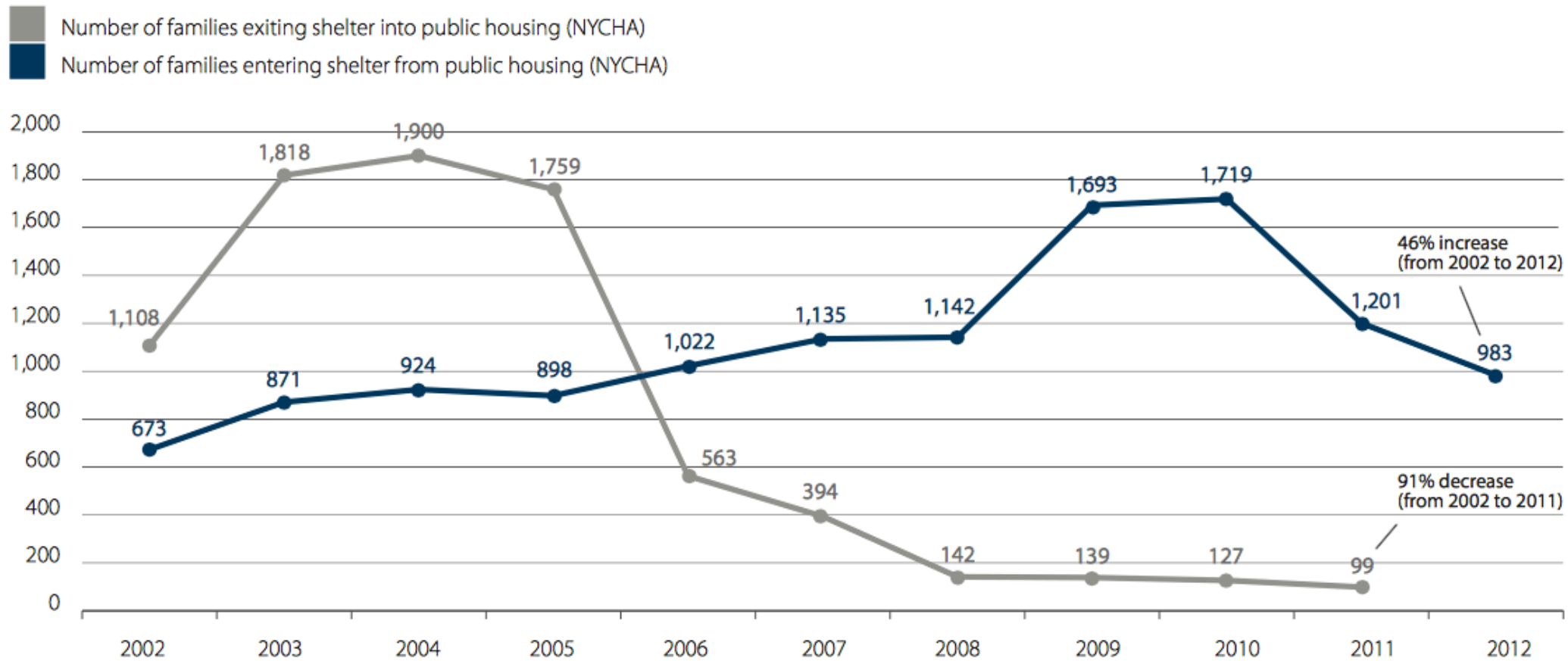

**PROPORTION OF FAMILY SHELTER ENTRIES BY HOUSING TYPE, 2002 – 2012**



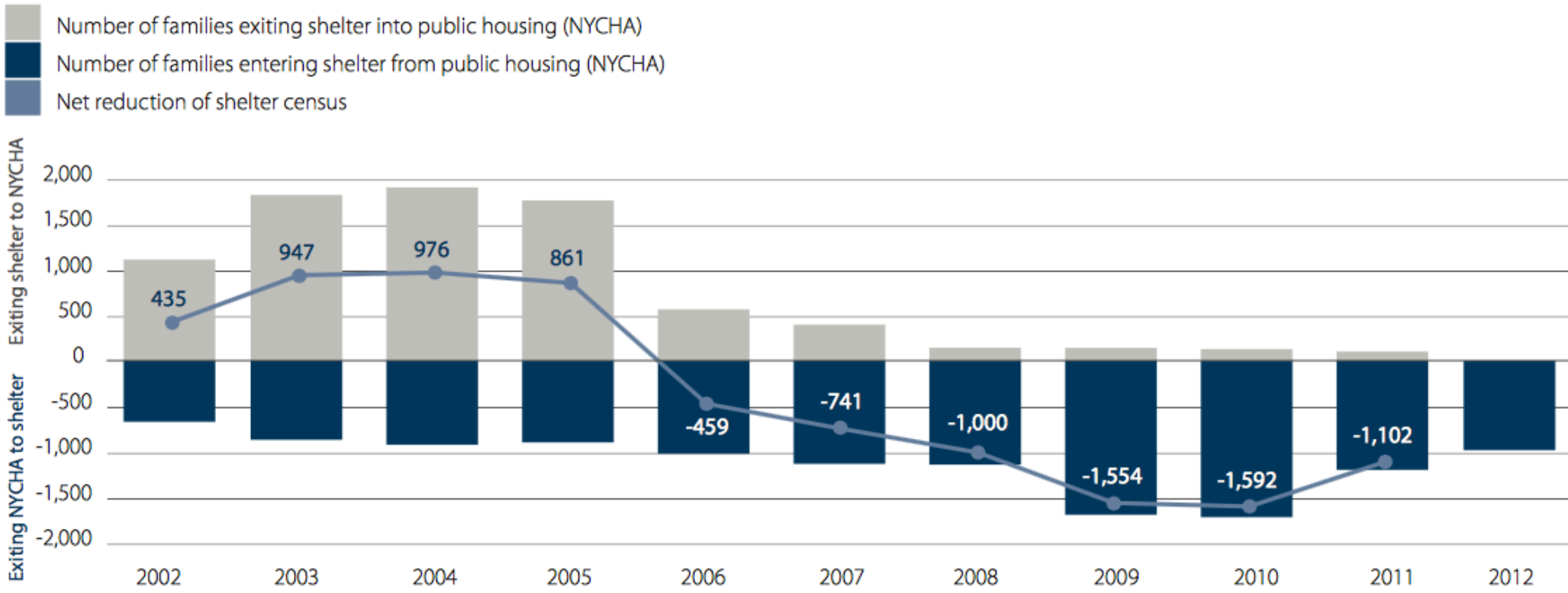

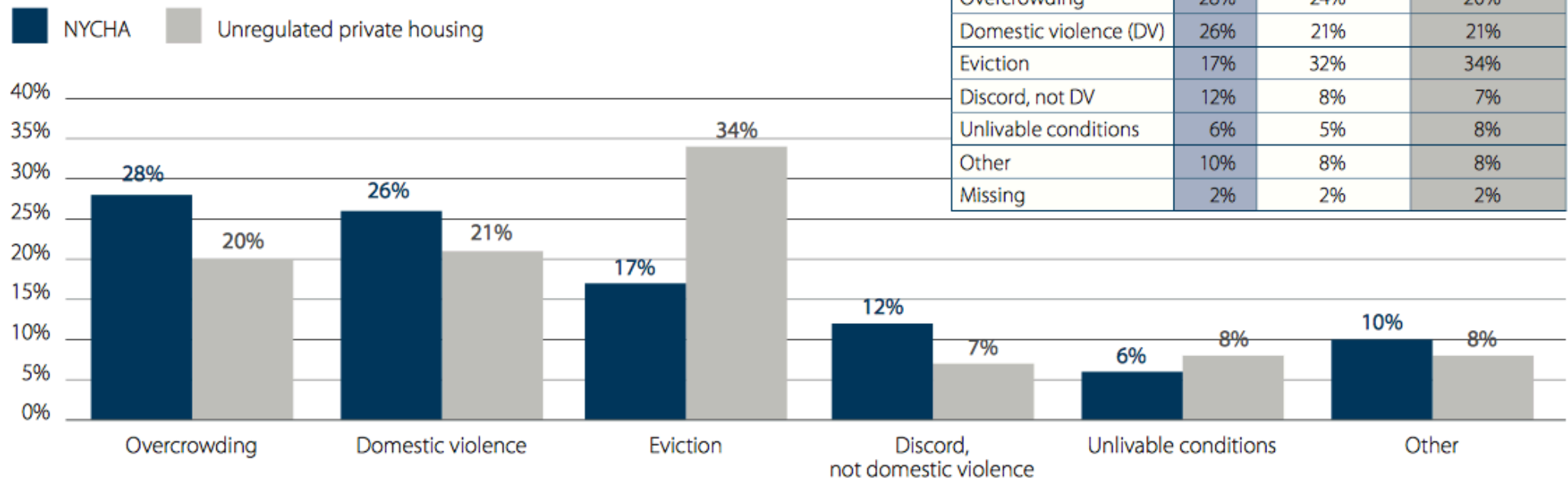
