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Key Findings

Over 4,100 homeless students attend school in District 2. Close to two-thirds of homeless students in the district are in high school.

Homeless students drop out at nearly twice the rate of their housed, low-income peers and nearly four times the rate of their housed, non-low-income peers. (11%, 6%, and 3%)



Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.
