## **Key Findings**

Nine percent of District 3 homeless students attend pre-K programs compared to four percent of housed students.

Homeless students in the district score proficient on State math assessments at less than half the rate of housed students citywide. (17% and 38%)

Homeless students transfer into the district at over twice the citywide rate. (19% and 9%)





The number of homeless students represents where students attend school; homeless students may attend schools in districts where they do not live. Ratio of elementary students who will experience homelessness by fifth grade is an estimate based on trends over the last six years; due to growing student homelessness, this is likely an underestimate. Students who experienced homelessness in the last six years is the ratio of currently homeless and formerly homeless students to the total number of students in the district. Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.
