Key Findings

Nearly 4,000 homeless students attended school in District 6 in SY 2015-16. This represents 16% of all students, with another 6% formerly homeless.

Although mid-year transfer rates among students in shelter declined by 10 points over the six-year period, chronic absenteeism persists at twice the rate of housed students and homeless students overall. (47%, 19%, and 24%)






