Key Findings

The number of homeless students living in the district grew by over 1,300 students between SY 2010–11 and SY 2015–16. The majority of that growth was driven by students living doubled-up.

Homeless students in District 7 had the second-highest dropout rate in the city in SY 2015–16 at 24%, and the district's graduation rate is 50 percent lower than the citywide average. (47% and 73%)




