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Key Findings

Homeless students in District 16 have seen an improvement in school stability, with declines in both the chronic absenteeism rate (53% to 41%) and mid-year transfer rate (37% to 26%) since SY 2010-11.

More than half of the homeless students in District 16 live in shelter. The district has the sixth-highest percentage of homeless students of any school district. (17% to 9% citywide)





Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.
