## **Key Findings**

There are no family shelters located in District 21, despite more than 2,000 homeless students attending school, including 400 students living in shelter.

Students living in shelter in District 21 face significant academic risks, including three times the mid-year transfer rate of their peers who are doubled up and six times the rate of their housed, low-income peers. (39%, 13%, and 6%)

Students who experienced homelessness in the last six years is the ratio of currently homeless and formerly homeless students to the total number of students in the district. Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.


