## **Key Findings**

Although over 2,700 homeless students attend school in District 27 including close to 1,000 students in shelter, only two family shelters are located in the district with capacity for just 194 families.

One in three District 27 students in the Class of 2016 who lived in other temporary homeless settings dropped out of high school, three times the rate of their low-income housed classmates or students living in shelter. (34%, 13%, and 11%)





Ratio of elementary students who will experience homelessness by fifth grade is an estimate based on trends over the last six years; due to growing student homelessness, this is likely an underestimate. Students who experienced homelessness in the last six years is the ratio of currently homeless and formerly homeless students to the total number of students in the district. Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.
