## **Key Findings**

Eighty-two percent of homeless students in District 30 live doubled up. Doubled-up students in District 30 have lower proficiency scores on their State math and English Language Arts assessments than their housed peers.

Chronic absenteeism among sheltered students in the district has increased slightly over the last six school years and remains roughly four times as high as housed students in the district.




#### Where Homeless Students Sleep

Students who experienced homelessness in the last six years is the ratio of currently homeless and formerly homeless students to the total number of students in the district. Notes on educational outcomes are listed in each section. Percentages may not add to 100% due to rounding. Dotted lines and dashes indicate missing data or data that have been redacted due to accuracy or student privacy. "In Temporary Arrangement" refers to students who were homeless living in other temporary settings, not in shelter.
