In 2017 alone, nearly 443,000 children spent time in foster care

And in 2016, over 40% of all children in foster care were under the age of 6





The trauma of parental addiction can impact children's mental and physical health over a lifetime.





5.7 million children in the U.S. live in households affected by a substance use disorder.
